■Comments from Japan Cultural Expo ambassador Kuroyanagi Tetsuko on her visit to the Tokyo National Museum, which is celebrating its 150th anniversary this year

My name is Kuroyanagi Tetsuko and I'm honored to be acting as public relations ambassador for the Japan Cultural Expo. The concept of the Japan Cultural Expo can be expressed as none other than the beauty of Japan. As public relations ambassador, it is my great pleasure to promote, in a way that is easy-to-understand and accessible to a greater number of people, the beauty of Japan that has been passed down to us since days of old and cultural artefacts that allow visitors to the expo to feel the spirit of Japan. These cultural artefacts include kimono and washoku, which I myself adore, traditional theater such as Kabuki and Noh, and artworks on display at the Tokyo National Museum, which I am visiting today.

One of the things embodying this beauty of Japan are the national treasures housed here at the Tokyo National Museum. The museum with the longest history in Japan, the Tokyo National Museum is home to 89 national treasures. This is a very valuable opportunity to see the museum's national treasures, which are not typically on view to the public, as the entire 89 will be on display to mark the memorial year this year. Japan has some 900 art and craft works that are designated as national treasures, and this is an amazing opportunity to be able to see 10% of them here. It was also my first opportunity to see them, and I can say that they were all wonderful. The sight of the Japanese swords lined up in a row was a highlight for me. I felt a sense of fear and awe as I found myself holding my breath as I viewed them. It is also interesting how calligraphy has changed to a softer style through time. I was able to learn about the history of the museum, and I enjoyed viewing the exhibitions while imagining how people who visited the museum 150 years ago must have been similarly impressed.

■150th Anniversary Special Exhibition

Tokyo National Museum: Its History and National Treasures

In commemoration of the 150th anniversary of its founding, the Tokyo National Museum is holding its first-ever special exhibition, in which all 89 national treasures in the museum's collection will be on display. Including an impactful corner where all the museum's 19 national treasure swords are exhibited together, the museum is presenting the appeal of its national treasures on an unprecedented scale.

In addition to national treasures, the museum is also presenting its history from the Meiji through the Reiwa eras through items in the collection and related materials from each era. Also on display are reproductions of items that were on display in the Yushima Seidō Exposition, held 150 years ago, and from the time of the Imperial Museum. Offering a sense of the history of the museum and experiences of the surprises and emotions that people must have felt 150 years ago, this is a perfect exhibition for the memorial year. We welcome you to take this special opportunity to visit the Tokyo National Museum.

■Our National Treasures: 150 Years in the Future

In an exhibition commemorating the 150th anniversary of the founding of the museum, candidates for national treasures that people hope to pass down into the future 150 years from now are displayed along with their background stories. This exhibition is the first open-call exhibition in the history of the Tokyo National Museum. Personal treasures that could become national treasures 150 years into the future have been collected from individuals and companies. Putting our heads together to think about them offers a new opportunity to feel the appeal of such items for people who have had few chances to see cultural properties and those who have not yet visited the Tokyo National Museum.

Candidates for national treasure are daily-life items, such as mobile phones, cars, comics, games, and fashion. Please enjoy a magnificent time capsule that has never existed before, where the passage of 150 years will create new national treasures.

■ Regular Exhibitions

In the Regular Exhibitions, Japanese and Asian cultural assets from various fields such as archeology, fine arts, and crafts, together with historical documents are on exhibit in five exhibition halls: the Tokyo National Museum Japanese Gallery (Honkan), Japanese Archaeology and Special Exhibition (Heiseikan), Asian Gallery (Toyokan), the Gallery of Horyuji Treasures, and Kuroda Memorial Hall. A total of 3,000 items are on exhibit, and a range of items in the collection and on loan are viewable at any time. Exhibits are changed about 300 times a year, so you are sure to discover something new each time you visit.

In 2022, as a project commemorating the 150th anniversary of the museum's founding, special thematic exhibitions will be held throughout the buildings. We welcome you to come enjoy them.

■JOMON DAYS/JOMON DAYS SATELLITE

Learning about the sustainable way of living in the Jomon period through original VR and workshops

Jomon Days is an exhibition and event where visitors can experience the sustainable way of living in the Jomon period through a look at its life and culture. Through videos produced for this project and exhibits of stone tools, dogū (clay figurines), earthenware, and fossilized fish bones excavated from the Sannai-Maruyama archaeological site in Aomori, which was registered as a World Cultural Heritage site in 2021 as part of the Jomon Prehistoric Sites in Northern Japan, this exhibition introduces the sustainable way of living of the period.

Jomon Days brings you an original VR experience where you can enter a Jomon period pit dwelling, a workshop where you can make miniature earthenware and comma-shaped beads, and also a time capsule project "To us in 2025" through which participants can set goals for how to work toward SDGs and keep these as a time capsule until 2025.

The Jomon culture, which survived for more than 10,000 years, was nurtured by the Jomon people, who adapted to climate change and lived as a part of nature while experiencing various natural disasters. The Jomon culture was a culture that respected all living things in the natural world and wished for the regeneration and circulation of life, and it is believed to have been a culture without major conflicts and in which villages helped each other, a culture unparalleled in the entire world. Jomon cultural values encapsulate our concept of SDGs, which is exactly what is required of us today. Taking a fresh look at Japan's Jomon culture can enable us to see what the future of the Japanese people and of Japan in the international community should be.

■ National Theatre Open House: In Commemoration of the Reconstruction Project – Towards a New Adventure –

A unique experience that can only be enjoyed at the National Theatre before its redevelopment.

The National Theatre, which opened in 1966, will be undertaking refurbishments for six years commencing in the fall, 2023 in a new step toward its future. National Theatre Open House is an event that is part of the "National Theatre Reconstruction Project – Towards a New Adventure –" before the theatre's redevelopment. Its lobby and auditorium that are normally only accessible to performance ticket holders will be made widely open to the public.

The National Theatre has many noteworthy features including its distinctive façade, its vestibule and interior, and gallery showcasing works by some of Japan's leading artists. Through the Self-Guided Audio Tour of the Theatre Lobby, visitors will be able to explore the inside of the theatre and its hidden charms using the audio guide app.

This program also offers a Stage Tour, where visitors can enjoy a first-hand experience of Kabuki stage mechanisms such as the *Hanamichi* and the revolving stage. Standing on the same stage as the actors, visitors can have a behind-the-scenes glimpse into the gorgeous world of the kabuki stage.

Furthermore, as a special event to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the birth of sculptor Hirakushi Denchu, the project is presenting a lecture and demonstration in which you can enjoy the delights of one of his masterpieces "Kagamijishi", a symbol of the National Theatre that has been much loved over the years. In addition to a special lecture by an invited lecturer from the Kodaira Hirakushi Denchu Art Museum, visitors will also be able to appreciate a live performance of "Shunkyo Kagamijishi," a famous *Nagauta* piece.

■The 43rd World Heritage Theater—Daigoji Temple—A Symphony of Esoteric Buddhism and **Culture, Nature and Culture**

Experience the teachings of esoteric Buddhism through play readings by popular voice actors

The founder of Shingon Buddhism, Kobo Daishi—also known as Kukai—has had a great influence on the Japanese people. His teachings will be presented at Daigoji Temple in a variety of media such as play readings and noh performances over the course of two days from Saturday December 17th to Sunday 18th. Daigoji Temple, a leading temple of the Shingon sect, is a registered World Cultural Heritage site.

On Saturday 17th, popular voice actors Namikawa Daisuke, Masuda Toshiki, and Ueda Hitomi will appear in the play reading of The Saint of Mt. Koya (by Izumi Kyoka) and The Earth God and the Fox (by Miyazawa Kenji). Visitors can enjoy powerful performances by famous voice actors in a solemn art space surrounded by the Buddhist statues and works of art of Daigoji Temple. In particular, The Saint of Mt. Koya presents the fantastic world experienced by monks training deep in the mountains. It is a wonderful opportunity to learn about the teachings of esoteric Buddhism, founded by Kukai, through a play reading. Also part of the program is The Culture of Esoteric Buddhism and the History of Daigoji Temple," a lecture that will be presented in an accessible way for younger generations by scholar of Japanese literature Nakanishi Susumu.

Meanwhile, the program for Sunday 18th also features a concert of shomyo, a style of chanting used in Buddhist rituals; a Noh performance of Jinen the Lay Monk by living national treasure Otsuki Bunzo and others; and a forum Thus Spoke Kukai, where experts from various fields including biologist Fukuoka Shinichi and sociologist Furuichi Noritoshi will talk about the significance of esoteric Buddhism in this day and age.
